A WELCOME GUIDE

Back to School

• Used Uniform Sale:

O Before the start of each school year, Queen's hosts a used uniform sale on the stage in the gym. Most items are \$1-\$2. Boys pants in particular can be hard to find, so it helps to shop earlier in the week.

• New Family Night:

An optional opportunity for new families to visit school the week before school starts. You and your child will be able to experience lunch, drop-off and pick-up, meet other new families, and see their classroom. This is a drop-in style event with no formal presentation.

• Welcome Back Walk Through:

New and current families are invited to come see the school the Sunday before school starts. You will be able to visit classrooms, drop off school supplies, meet teachers, enjoy a treat with refreshments, and learn about different opportunities that Queen's School has to offer.

• Parent Night:

• This is an opportunity to learn about school and classroom expectations. Mrs. Hartley begins the night in the gym with a general talk and then followed by classroom presentations from the teachers. This is an important night to learn about what to expect for the upcoming school year.

• Class Lists:

• These lists will be posted on the school website as well as on the windows near the Wisner entrance a week prior to school starting.

• Grade Level Supplies:

• You will find grade level supply lists on the school website. Please label your child's items, especially uniform sweaters/sweatshirts. It might be a good idea to have a few extra supplies on hand for later in the school year.

• First Day of School:

- It is an out of uniform day. Teachers will be out on the playground extra early to help guide students. It is a half day with dismissal at 11:30.
- Ocoffee is offered for parents sponsored by the PTO. This is a great way to meet new people or catch up with ones you already know. If the weather is nice, this event will be held in the parking lot. If the weather is uncooperative, then it will move into the cafeteria.

Getting to and from School

Bussing:

- Lumen Bus: A LC bus will transport students between the schools before and after school for a small fee. LC also has buses traveling to and from Marshall, Chelsea, and Michigan Center. Please call (517) 787-0630 for more information.
- JPS Bus: If you live in Jackson Public School District you can be bussed to and from Queen's using JPS busses. You must call JPS Transportation to set it up. The phone number is (517) 841-2180.
- YMCA Bus: The Y offers classes periodically throughout the school year. Fliers will be sent home. The bus will transport from school to the Y.

Drop-Off:


- Morning drop-off occurs from 7:35-8:00 a.m.
- There is a single file land behind the church. Please keep the line moving. Do not sit in the lane.

Walking to School:

- Crosswalks: Crossing guard at Morrell and Wisner Street only.
- o Bike Rack
 - Located near the northeast corner of the school
 - Be sure to lock up the bike during the day.

• End of Day Procedures:

- Pick-Up Lane:
 - This is different from the morning drop-off. It is U-shaped. Follow the cones. Do not leave your car parked in the lane. Keep moving forward so cars don't block traffic on Wisner Street.
 - Playground: Your child can play on the playground after school if you are out of your car and watching them. Mrs. Hartley will bring in anyone who doesn't have a ride yet by 3:25 p.m. They will be sent to Latchkey.





After School Opportunities

Latchkey:

Queen's offers morning care from 7-7:45 a.m. and after school care from 3:10-5:30 p.m.
 Please see the office for current rates.

YMCA:

The YMCA offers after school care for a fee. They will pick up students from school and bring them to the YMCA. Contact the YMCA for all of the options.

Communication

Newsletters:

- Every Friday, you will get emailed a school-wide newsletter with important information about the following week. Please let the office know if you are not receiving the emails.
- Classroom teachers will also provide a weekly newsletter with important information.

• Emails:

- Teachers will often communicate via email. If you aren't receiving anything, please contact your child's teacher to make sure they have the correct email.
- Mrs. Hartley will also send out email blasts from time to time with important information.

• School Closing Phone Call:

A School Reach phone call will be sent out if school is cancelled. If you don't answer, it will leave a voicemail for you to check later.

• Student Information System:

Oueen's School uses PowerSchool. You will have a special code for each of your children. The office will have this information for you and can help assist as you log in for the first time. PowerSchool is where you will find your child's grades for each subject and the lunch balance. You can set up notifications to come to your email or through the app to keep up to date on any changes to the grades. Teachers will usually update grades on a weekly basis. Kindergarten and first grade are only graded based on skill and effort so you may see teachers add assignments that look like they have a grade attached, but students won't get a letter grade.

• Assignment Notebooks:

Starting in 2nd grade, students will have assignment notebooks to write down daily assignments, future tests, and other notes. Be sure to check with your child each night so they complete the assignments. In grades 3 and 4, parents are required to sign the notebook nightly.

Communication Continued

• Parent/Teacher Conferences:

- o In the fall, you will have the opportunity to meet with your child's teachers to go over the report card and other important information about your child. Being partners to help your child succeed academically, morally, and spiritually is very important.
- If you would like to set up another meeting with your child's teacher outside of fall conferences, please email them to set up a time.

Lost and Found:

of the office. Be sure to put their name on all items so it is easy to return.

Office Check-In/Check Out Procedures:

- o If you are bringing your child to school late, you must sign them in on the clipboard in the office. They will be marked tardy until 10:00 a.m. and a ½ day absent after that.
- If you need to pick up your child early from school, please sign them out in the office. It is helpful to send an email or note to the teacher so they can help make sure your child is ready on time.

• Illnesses/Absences:

- o If your child is staying home due to an illness or another reason, you must call and let the office know. It would also help to let the teacher know that your child will be absent.
- See the Student-Parent Handbook for more details.

Make-Up Work:

- Please contact the teacher or the office if you would like make-up work from when your child is absent. Give the teacher enough notice to gather assignments.
- It is the parent's responsibility to assist the child in completing the missed work.
- o If you are leaving for an extended period of time, it is up to the teacher if work can be provided in advance. Please contact your child's teacher to discuss a plan.

• Birthday Treats:

- As a school, we prefer to have treats that are easy to pass out and clean up. Healthy treats are a bonus!
- Summer birthdays will be at the discretion of the teacher.
- Every month, birthdays will be celebrated as a school and your child will get to enjoy a treat at lunchtime and can be out of uniform that day as well.

Uniforms

• School uniform:

- Red or white polo shirt with navy pants or shorts (until end of September and starting in May)
 - Please see the Student-Parent Handbook for a more detailed description of the uniform and dress code.
- Make sure you have your child's name inside each sweatshirt or zip up to make it easier to return.
- Monthly Spirit Days:
 - Your child can wear uniform pants and the spirit t-shirt that was provided by the school or a Lumen Christi t-shirt.
- Out of Uniform Days:
 - Throughout the school year the students will have days when they can be out of uniform.
 - Oftentimes, this will require a donation of \$2. The money is given to different charities.
 - During your child's birthday month, there will be a special day when they can be out of uniform to celebrate.
 - On field trips that take place outside, students can usually be out of uniform.



Growing in Faith

Weekly Mass:

- On Fridays, the entire school will attend Mass. Different classrooms host mass each week.
 This means that the students do the readings, take up the gifts, and greet at the doors.
 Students from the St. Cecelia Choir cantor. Parents and family members are always welcome. The students sit towards the front of the church with their classes.
- We will also attend Mass on Holy Days and Ash Wednesday.

Monthly Adoration:

 Adoration takes place once a month on Fridays at the church in the afternoon for all K-6 students.

• Monthly Virtue:

• Every month, students will focus on a new virtue. Check out the bulletin board near the cafeteria entrance to see what virtue we are working on for the current month.

• RCIA:

• Reconciliation:

Students who are practicing Catholics in grades 2 through 6 have the opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation twice a year, during Advent and Lent. Second Graders will receive their First Reconciliation during December.

• Stations of the Cross:

• Every Friday during Lent at 2:30, you are invited to join the school for a reflection on Jesus' journey to Calvary.

• May Procession:

• The second graders wear their First Communion outfits and are honor guards. A special ceremony to honor Mary on the Friday before Memorial Day at 10:30 a.m. in the church. No school Mass takes place. It is a half day. Parents and families are encouraged to join us.

• Kindergarten Mass:

• Kindergarten will host a special mass at the end of the year. They will showcase how much they have learned throughout the year. The preschoolers who will be in kindergarten the following year will also be invited!

Last Day of School Mass:

- O To celebrate the last day of school and the advancing 6th graders, everyone is invited for this special send-off. Get to mass early as it does fill up quickly. After mass, the 6th graders and their families attend a mini-celebration in the gym.
- Everyone dresses up on the last day of school.

Differentiated Instruction

Reading Room:

Students are identified for needing extra support through beginning of the year assessments.
 Students attend the reading room 4 days a week for 30 minutes working in a small group setting on focused literacy instruction.

• Math Room:

Our math specialist works with teachers to determine who needs extra support. She helps students in small groups and one on one.

• Aides:

- Kindergarten will have a full time aide to help teachers with small groups and other tasks.
- There will be other adult aides to help out teachers in grades 1-6.

• ISD:

- The ISD helps Queen's School determine eligibility for services through a SST (Student Study Team)
- The Jackson ISD provides services for students who qualify with a Non-Public Service Plan.
 These include speech, occupational therapy, physical therapy, social worker, and a teacher consultant.

Accelerated Math:

 Students in grades 3 through 6 have the opportunity to be challenged in an accelerated paced math class. Students are placed after being given an assessment and by recommendation from previous teacher.

• NWEA MAP testing (Grades 2-6)

Students in grades 2 through 6 will take the NWEA MAP test three times a year in the subjects of math and reading. This test measures growth across the school year and across grade levels. Teachers use the data to help with instruction. Encourage your child to take their time, read carefully, and do their very best. A healthy breakfast and good night's sleep is also recommended. You will get the results from your child's MAP test in the report card envelopes twice a year.

Technology:

- All classrooms have a SMART board display along with a document camera to help enhance lessons.
- 1st through 6th grade classrooms either have a class set of iPads or Chromebooks. These are
 used for researching, typing, and helping to differentiate using several apps such as Freckle
 and Sumdog just to name a few.
- The computer lab is available for teachers to use to help with other projects and to practice typing.

Differentiated Instruction Continued

• Specials Classes:

- The following are the Specials classes that all K-6 students attend once a week. These are enrichment classes that can help students find and develop talents and passions outside of the classroom.
 - Gym
 - Art
 - Spanish
 - Music
 - Library
 - Computers

• Tutoring:

 Many teachers offer tutoring after school and during the summer for both math and reading for a small fee. Contact Mrs. Hartley or your classroom teacher to find out who is offering tutoring.

Discipline

• Mark-offs:

Everyone makes mistakes. Mark-offs are a type of consequence for either poor behavior or lack of responsibility. In grades 2-5, 10 mark-offs within a month will earn a detention. In 6th grade, 8 mark-offs will earn a detention. If your child gets a mark-off in a specials class, it will count as 2 mark-offs.

• Detentions:

• Detentions often occur during lunchtime or after school for 30 minutes. If your child has a detention, you will get a slip to sign and return to school.

Incompletes:

In 5th and 6th grade, if your child doesn't complete or turn in an assignment they will get an incomplete assignment form. A parent needs to sign the form and the assignment needs to be turned in the next day. If it doesn't get signed or the assignment doesn't get turned in, it will result in another incomplete. Three incompletes will equal a detention. Each month is a fresh start.

• Quarterly Rewards:

o If your child does not get a detention, they will be given a special reward. Each quarter is a fresh start. Some rewards in the past have included game time, movies, a special treat, and even extra recess.

Grades

Weekly Packs:

- Every Friday, your child will bring home a weekly paper pack. These will be papers that your child has completed and the teacher has corrected. You are expected to work with your child to correct any mistakes they have made using red pen/pencil. The purpose of this is to help your child learn from their mistakes and for you to see how your child is doing.
- Once you and your child make corrections, you will sign the front of the pack and return it to school on Monday.

• Codes:

- Some things that your child completes in class will be graded based on mastering their grade's learning goals or standards. This allows you to see how your child is growing in that grade level. It also helps the teacher determine who needs extra help and who needs to be challenged. These codes do contribute to your child's final grade.
 - On PowerSchool, some assignments will be labeled as the following:
 - Exceeds- Student demonstrates understanding and performance beyond proficiency and has exceeded the standard.
 - Meeting- Student demonstrates proficiency on all grade level skills of the standard.
 - Approaching- Student demonstrates proficiency in some skills of the standard.
 - Developing- Student demonstrates proficiency in 1-2 skills of the standard and needs significant help to gain understanding.

• Grades K-1

• Your child will be assessed based on skill and effort on a variety of standards.

• Grade 2

• Along with skills and effort, your child will get letter grades in reading, spelling, and math.

• Grade 3

 Along with skills and effort, your child will get letter grades in reading, spelling, english, science, social studies, and math.

• Grades 4-6

• Your child will get a letter grade in all subjects (reading, spelling, english, science, social studies, math, and religion) as well as a skill and effort grade.

In the Classroom

• Classroom Locations:

- Kindergarten through second grade classrooms as well as the library and computer lab are located on the first floor. Third grade through sixth grade classrooms and the math and reading room are located on the second floor.
- Music and Art can be found on the second floor of the older building. Spanish and the
 Science Lab can be found on the third floor of this building.

• Big Projects:

- o 1st Grade:
 - First grade celebrates the 100th Day of School by making a collection of 100 items and dressing up like a 100 year old.
- o 2nd Grade:
 - There will be two retreats to help prepare for your child to receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist.
- 3rd Grade:
 - Market Day
 - Pioneer Day
- o 4th Grade:
 - Wax Museum
 - Trip to the State Capitol Building
- o 5th Grade:
 - American History Project
 - Lunch Duty:
 - Students help serve hot lunch and work in the kitchen (rotates with 6th grade)
- o 6th Grade
 - Ancient World Project, Living Stations, Talent Show, Camp Kimball
 - 1st Grade Friends
 - Lunch Duty:
 - Students help serve hot lunch and work in the kitchen (rotates with 5th grade)
 - 6th Grade Service Aides:
 - Students rotate to help out kindergarteners on the playground in the morning and at recess.

• K-3 Snack:

O In grades K through 3rd grade, students can bring a small, healthy snack to eat during the morning. Please make sure it is easy to clean up.

Christmas Program:

Students in grades K-6 come together to perform Christmas songs to help kickoff the Christmas holiday. Concert starts at 7 p.m. There is usually a line before the doors open so plan on arriving early! Students should wear their red uniform shirt and uniform pants.



Money

Tuition Payments:

• Please check FACTS for information regarding your tuition payments or email Karla Warriner @myjacs.org.

• Lunch Money:

- Check PowerSchool for current lunch account balance.
- A note will come home with your child if there is a negative balance on the account.
- To pay the lunch bill, you can send in a check or you can pay online using Online Giving through Queen's Church. Just go to https://www.osvhub.com/queen-of-the-miraculous-medal/giving/funds and then select Student Lunches.

• Lost Library Books:

• If your child doesn't turn in their library book, they will receive a notice from the librarian. If the book cannot be found, a fee needs to be paid. This money can be turned into the librarian.

• Service Projects:

- During Lent and various other times of the year, Queen's School raises money for special causes.
- Each grade level also has an annual service project. Different collections may happen that could include donating items or money to help complete the project.

• Financial Aid Opportunities:

- o Grant and aid is available for families that qualify. You must apply on FACTS.
- TRIP: Tuition Reduction Incentive Program (TRIP) is a great way to reduce your tuition bill by doing your everyday shopping. TRIP is issued in the form of gift cards that can be used just like cash to purchase everyday essentials like food, clothing, or gas. You don't have to buy anything extra or spend a penny more, simply use TRIP to make purchases and see your savings grow.
 - TRIP takes place at Lumen Christi School on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 9:00-2:30 p.m.
 - Regular TRIP must be dropped off by 9:00 on Tuesday for pick up the following Tuesday.
 - A TRIP order dropped off AFTER 9:00 will NOT be processed until the following week.
 - If you place your online order before 9 am by Tuesday morning, it will be included in the bulk order and will be ready for pickup here in the office on Tuesday morning.

Money Continued

• Fundraisers:

- Men's Club Dinner and Raffle: Every year in November, Men's Club hosts a draw down dinner. The money supports projects and purchasing items for the school.
- Yearly Fundraiser: Most years, the school PTO has a large fundraiser to collect money for the school. This is in leu of selling random items like magazines or candy bars. The projects vary from year to year, but usually are ones that require a large sum of money to accomplish.

• Party Supplies/Classroom Needs:

Teachers may send out a Sign-Up Genius with items that are needed for class parties and other classroom necessities. There are two class parties per year; Halloween and Valentine's Day.



Volunteer Opportunities

• Virtus training:

- All volunteers need to complete Virtus training
- See the office for more information to sign up for a training.

• Sign-In and Parking:

When you arrive to volunteer, park in the office parking lot. Once inside, please check in with the secretaries. There is a clipboard where you will sign in and out.

• Sign-Up Genius:

Mrs. Hartley will send out a Sign-Up Genius at the beginning of the year and throughout the year as volunteers are needed. Just sign up for the things you are interested in!

• Things to Volunteer for (these are just a few):

- o Cafeteria Duty:
 - Take student lunch cards, help children get milk/water, napkins, silverware, and assist with other items at lunch. Wash tables once lunch is finished.
 - First lunch begins at 11:30 and second lunch ends by 12:30, be in the cafeteria by 11:25.
 - Volunteers get to enjoy a free lunch.
- Morning Playground Duty:
 - Scheduled for one week at a time to assist principal with supervising students on the playground from 7:35-8:05 a.m. If you can't commit to a week at a time, let Mrs. Hartley know and she can try to find you a partner.
- o Field Day:
 - You will be in charge of a station to help run while each class rotates through.
- o Lock-Ins:
 - Twice a year (on a Friday evening usually in winter and spring), we need lots of help to run different activities such as face painting, crafts, game room, etc. If you volunteer during the lock-in, your kids are free.
- Book Fair:
 - You can sign up to help during library class times or during the open house to help students shop at the book fair. Usually, you sign up for when your child will be at their library special.
- o Mileage Club:
 - During recess on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays in April and May, you can help scan QR codes as students make their laps around the playground.

Volunteer Opportunities Continued

- Collate Papers in August:
 - Help organize papers for kindergarten. This is a one day commitment of 2-4 hours.
- Covering Books with Contact Paper:
 - On occasion, the librarian will need new library books covered with contact paper. The books and contact paper will be sent home so this task can be done at your convenience.
- o Popcorn Fridays:
 - Volunteers will help pop, bag, and deliver popcorn to classrooms. This a once a month commitment for about 3-4 hours on a Friday morning.
- o PTO:
 - Help support the teachers and students by attending PTO meetings to plan special events and fundraisers. The meetings are on the second Tuesday of each month at 3:30 p.m.
- School Improvement Team:
 - This team of parents and teachers meet to gather resources and strategies to help improve our school. The team meets 6-7 times a year on the third Tuesday of the month at 3:30 p.m.
- Men's Club:
 - The Men's Club has been a constant source of physical, spiritual, and financial support for our school. Some activities they help with are skating parties in the gym and supplying the cook-out for our field day just to name a few. Meetings are held the first Wednesday of the month at the rectory from 8-9 p.m.







Fun School Events

Popcorn Fridays:

Once a month, your child can get popcorn. It is 50 cents per bag with a limit of 2 bags each time. You can pay for an entire year in advance. If you choose to do this, please make sure the money is in an envelope labeled with your child's name.

• Lock-Ins:

• Twice a year, students can enjoy some fun activities at the lock-in for a small fee. This is a fundraiser for PTO and benefits the school. Activities include face painting, Legos, games, karaoke, Wii games, gym games, and more. Bring some money to purchase pop and pizza. Popcorn, lemonade, and water are free to enjoy!

Monthly Roller Skating:

O Typically this happens once a month on a Friday from 6-8 p.m. in the school gym. The cost is \$10 per child or \$25 per family over 3 children. Plan on bringing some extra cash to purchase candy, drinks, and snacks. No cell phones are allowed and will be kept at the check-in table. The Men's Club hosts the event and is a fundraiser for the school.

Catholic Schools' Week:

- Hosting Mass:
 - The weekend before the start of Catholic Schools' Week, the students of Queen's School will host all the Masses. A sign up sheet will be sent home a few weeks earlier with the different job options available. If your child volunteers, they should wear their school uniform to Mass that day.

Book Fair:

- Students are able to bring in money on their library/computer day to shop at the Book Fair. They can bring in cash, check, or even fill up an e-wallet with money. The e-wallet is connected to Scholastic.
- The Book Fair is also open during the open house. This tends to be very busy. You are able to use cash, check, e-wallet, or credit/debit card.

• Teacher Appreciation Day:

■ PTO sponsors a luncheon for teachers and staff. They need volunteers to help with this event.

Student Appreciation Day

■ Students can be out of uniform on this day. There are fun events for students to enjoy including a free lunch.

o Parent/Family Appreciation Day

This is when our open house takes place. Visit the classrooms to see your child's work and check out the hallways for lots of projects. The book fair will be set up in the cafeteria. Enjoy cookies and lemonade in the gym.

Fun School Events Continued

• Daddy/Daughter Dance:

• This event is sponsored by one of the guilds at church. Enjoy a fun night of dancing with your daughter. A photographer is on hand to take photos of each father/daughter duo.

• Mother/Son Glow Party:

• The PTO sponsors an annual mother/son glow party. Wear some bright colors and enjoy some dancing. There are also games to be played in the cafeteria. Popcorn and lemonade included!

• Reading Month:

- o In March, Queen's School celebrates Reading Month. This is a fun way to incorporate reading in our daily lives. A reading calendar comes home at the beginning of March with some fun activities including:
 - Donuts with Dad (Grandpas, Uncles, Family Friends)
 - This event (usually on a Wednesday) takes place from 7:40-8:10 a.m. Dads and kids bring along their favorite books to read together and enjoy coffee, juice and donuts.
 - Muffins with Mom (Grandma, Aunts, Family Friends)
 - This event (usually on a Wednesday) takes place from 7:40-8:10am. Moms and kids bring along their favorite books to read together and enjoy coffee, juice and muffins.
 - Games with Grandparents
 - This event (usually on a Friday) takes place right after Mass. Grandparents can bring board games to play with their grandchildren.

• Field Trips:

The number and type of field trips are determined by the grade level and the teachers.
 Permission slips must be signed and returned to school. There may be a fee to help cover the cost of the bus and the activity.

• Mileage Club:

• Students earn tokens and prizes by walking laps around the school during recess in the springtime. 6 laps equals a mile and the entire school works together to "walk" around Michigan.

• Field Day:

Field Day is typically on the Tuesday of the last week of school and takes place at Lumen Christi. Each grade level wears a specific color t-shirt. Don't forget to pack a water bottle for your child! A sign-up genius will be emailed to sign up to volunteer. After Field Day the students come back to Queen's and enjoy a hot dog lunch with potato chips and watermelon sponsored by the Men's Club.

Extracurricular Activities

• Altar Serving:

4th-6th graders are invited to altar serve for weekend Masses as well as 9:00 Mass on Mondays and Fridays. Fr. Tim hosts altar server training each year. Info will come home with the students as the date approaches. You can also contact the parish office for more information.

• Sports:

- o Football:
 - Jr. Titans (K-3)
 - Knights (3-6)
- Cheerleading: (3-6)
- o Basketball:
 - Rec. basketball (4-6)
 - Jr. Titans Basketball (K-3)
- Girls Running Club:
 - Grades 3-6 can participate in a running club during the spring. This takes place after school. There is a small fee to join.
- 6th graders
 - Cross Country for LC (Fall)
 - Tennis for LC (Spring)

• Robotics:

- Middle School Robotics Team (6th Graders)
- Lego League (3-5)

• Choir Options:

- St. Cecelia Singers:
 - St. Cecilia Singers is the school choir open to students in 4th-6th grade. They perform during the Christmas program and at a few Masses throughout the year.
- Lumen Christi Choir:
 - 4th-6th Graders can join an additional choir at Lumen Christi. There is a bus available to take them over to Lumen Christi.
- Let it Shine Choir:
 - A Queen's children's choir open to any parishioner, 2nd-6th grade. They have the opportunity to sing at a few Masses throughout the year and also get to perform in a musical.



More Extracurricular Activities

• Strings Team:

O Beginning in 4th grade, students have an opportunity to take classes at the Jackson Symphony Orchestra and learn the violin. This is in a group setting with other area schools. They offer a 1st and 2nd year string team with options to branch out into other stringed instruments or move into private lessons.

• Band:

o 6th graders will have the opportunity to learn to play an instrument. They start their day at Lumen Christi and are bussed back to Queen's after band class.

Art at LC:
